STORY OF IMPACT: THE FARMLANDS TRUST SOCIETY – OUR VISIT TO NEWMAN FARM

Time is a funny thing! Sometimes it passes by so quickly and other times so slowly! It felt like such a short time ago when PECSF HQ engaged with donors, volunteers and champions during our ThoughtExchange in the spring. You expressed how important it is to hear about the impact that giving through PECSF can have in your communities. We listened.

Recently, members of PECSF HQ and the Greater Victoria Regional Committee visited Newman Farm in Saanichton, where members of the <u>Farmlands Trust (Greater Victoria) Society</u> (FLT) are the agricultural stewards. During our visit we learned more about the FLT Society's history and achievements. We were grateful for the chance to meet them in person and see their labour of love, growing assorted fruits, vegetables, herbs and flowers.



What is the Farmlands Trust (Greater Victoria) Society?

The FLT Society's mission is to facilitate Greater Victoria farmland preservation and to enhance food security to benefit current and future generations. After having the chance to support the preservation of Madrona Farm, located in the Blenkinsop Valley, the FLT Society was grateful to get more involved with the historic Newman Farm. The farm was willed to the District of Central Saanich following the passing of John Newman in 2003, with the stipulation that the land be used for a park and/or organic farming.

The FLT Society's success comes from developing unique partnerships with other organizations and not-for-profits, and from incredible support from local volunteers. Their <u>Field to Plate</u> Program was a new addition to the 2020 to 2022 <u>Greater Victoria Fund Supported Pool (FSP)</u>.

This unique initiative is based on engagement between Our Place Society (OPS) and the FLT Society. OPS is consulted about what gets planted at Newman Farm, so they can maximize the benefits of the donated organic produce. This allows OPS to meet the needs of vulnerable citizens who access their regional meal and snack programs, dining facilities and local drop-in facilities daily. The focus on planting, growing and harvesting healthy organic produce helps people who are in need in Greater Victoria, aiding in relieving poverty and addressing food insecurity.

Our visit to Newman Farm



When we arrived on the farm, we were at once humbled by the incredible work taking place. We visited while the produce and flowers were still in full bloom. What had once been a vacant field was now rows of beautiful, lush vegetables, fruit and flowers. The work necessary to tend this land, from planting to weeding, pruning and harvesting is carried out by a part-time farm manager, part-time farm assistant and volunteers contributing their time and effort.

As PECSF champions, many of you know that food brings people together to create meaningful and lifelong connections, whether it's a chili cook-off, a soup fundraiser or a community farm like Newman Farm.

Meeting the farmers



During our visit we had the opportunity to meet Dr. Natasha Caverley, Secretary of the FLT Society Board of Directors, and Bert James, FLT Society Newman Farm Manager. They shared their passions and lessons learned from the Newman's legacy and working on the farm. As a retired farmer from Ontario and a long-time neighbour of the Newmans, Bert got involved with the recovery and transformation of the property.

Bert's sunflower 'field of dreams' garden is a proud accomplishment, along with the other work he does aiming to increase pollinators in the area. This goal led to a partnership with Sea Cider, the closest apiary. The farm is alive and producing beautiful, healthy fruit and vegetables because of his passion and work.


Newman Farm has been recognized worldwide as a Certified Bee Friendly Farm by the Pollinator Partnership. In 2018, the FLT Society was awarded the Pollinator Advocate Award for

Canada from the Pollinator Partnership, the world's largest organization dedicated to the protection and promotion of pollinators.

Natasha and Bert share their story as far and wide as possible, promoting their approach as an easily adoptable model for other organic farms to follow. Their hope is that others feel inspired to try it as well.
